Derek Gillman includes in paper that, "The idea of cultural heritage has become widespread in many countries, justifying government regulation and providing the background to disputes over valuable works of art and architecture" [3].

TK Gireesh Kumar includes in his paper that, "Lack of information about the heritage sites, structures and its significance, especially unprotected and unidentified, leads to its permanent loss" [4].

Somenath Halder et al. include in paper that, "The selected zones (Zone 1: Rajasthan; Zone 2: West Bengal, Jharkhand and Odisha; Zone 3: Uttar Pradesh, Bihar and Madhya Pradesh) proved as the best suitable sites where ICH tourism, geoheritage and geopark should be developed" [5].

Khoa Vu Hoang mentions in paper that, "knowing how to use this heritage for sustainable tourism development, while preserving and promoting the heritage value for future generations, is not a simple task." This highlights the delicate balance required between leveraging cultural heritage for economic benefits and ensuring its protection for posterity [6].

Mr L Jenifar et al. mentions that, "By addressing challenges, embracing opportunities, and fostering collaboration, India can ensure the long-term preservation and accessibility of its rich cultural legacy for future generations to cherish and celebrate" [7].

Indian art, religion, and social life deeply influenced Central Asian culture, while India itself adopted innovations such as silk-making from China and coin-minting from Greece and Rome" [13].

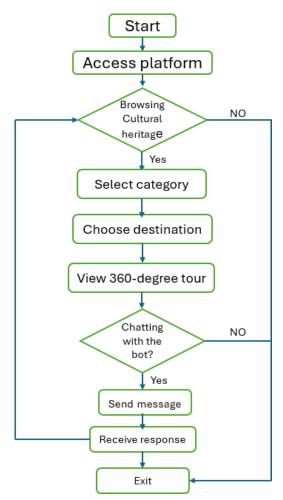


Fig. 1: Activity Diagram Depicting User Interaction with the Cultural Heritage Platform

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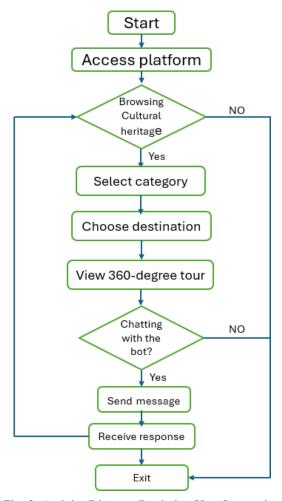


Fig. 2: Activity Diagram Depicting User Interaction with the Cultural Heritage Platform
